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Call for Papers (2nd notice) NAAHoLS at LSA

The 2017 NAAHoLS meeting will again be held in conjunction with the Linguistic Society of America, the American Dialect Society, the American Name Society, the Society for the Study of the Indigenous Languages of the Americas, and the Society for Pidgin and Creole Linguistics. Featured LSA plenary speakers this year include Colleen Fitzgerald (University of Texas at Arlington), Gennaro Chierchia (Harvard University), and Walt Wolfram (North Carolina State University).

The annual meeting will take place in Austin, Texas from 5-8 January 2017. Further details about the meeting will be available in the coming months.

As in the past, we invite papers relating to any aspect of the history of the language sciences. All presenters must be members of the association (contact the NAAHoLS Secretary for details). Papers will be 20 minutes, with 10 minutes for discussion. Abstracts should be submitted as file attachments (MS Word). The length of the abstract should not exceed 500 words – upon acceptance, a shorter (100-word) abstract will also be requested for the LSA meeting handbook. **The deadline for NAAHoLS abstracts is 1 September 2016.**

CALL FOR PAPERS

The Fourteenth International Conference on the History of the Language Sciences, **ICHoLS XIV**, will be held from August 28 to September 1, 2017 in Paris.

Since 1978, ICHoLS conferences have brought together specialists in the discipline every three years. Previous conferences have been held in Ottawa, Lille, Princeton, Trier, Galway, Washington, Oxford, Fontenay-St Cloud (Paris), São Paulo & Campinas, Urbana-Champaign, Potsdam (2008), St Petersburg (2011), and Vila Real (2014).

All proposals (for workshops, papers, or posters) concerned with the history, epistemology, or historiographical problems of the language sciences are welcome. We encourage proposals for the organization of thematic workshops, whether open or closed. These must be sent to the organizing committee before June 30, 2016; notification of accepted proposals will be made on July 29, 2016 and the topics of open workshops will be advertised on the conference website.

Proposals for papers or posters must be submitted no later than October 1, 2016, and notification of accepted proposals will be made on March 1, 2017.

Proposals (consisting of a description of a maximum of 400 words, including bibliography) are to be submitted on the conference website (<http://ichols14.sciencesconf.org>) via a personal space (see "How to submit a proposal" within the website).
